

BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS REGULAR MEETING
MONDAY, JUNE 1, 2015
7:00 P.M.

CALL TO ORDER: Chairman Sam Abatta called the meeting of June 1, 2015 to order at the Municipal Complex, 1000 Church Hill Road at 7:00 p.m.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

ROLL CALL: Mapel-Present, Barefoot-Present, Kisow-Present, Shiwarski-Present, Abatta-Present. Also in attendance were Jack Cambest, Esq., Township Manager Silka, Treasurer Kezmarsky, Planning Director Urbano, Engineer Meyer and Mrs. Merks for the purpose of taking minutes.

Chairman Abatta, we are going to modify the agenda a little bit this evening because of some timely things that have come up. Before we hear from Marissa Boff Haney, I am going to ask for citizens comments. We have one person signed in to speak, Jerry Brouker and he has a special announcement concerning some voluntary work and something that we are very proud of that goes on in Robinson Township.

CITIZENS COMMENTS

Mr. Brouker (284 Coraopolis Rd.), I appreciate the opportunity to speak at the beginning of the meeting. All that I am here to do is just remind everybody and to advertise for our benefit fundraiser. We are going to do it again for Amy's Angels. It is called Rockin for Amy's Angels and will be held on June 27th. It is the second annual. We were very fortunate to have a great deal with it last year. We had about 800 people and great help from everyone, including the Township. We were able to put the signs wherever we wanted to. Commissioner/Fire Chief Kisow helped us out incredibly with the Groveton and the Forest Grove Fire Dept. I know that they have already committed to doing that again this year. We will have the billboards up this week and the flyers are in. We have a nice bike run in the morning for those of you who are inclined to do that. For those of us that are civilians, you can hang out whenever you want. Throughout the day we will have 9 bands, mostly large named acts from Pittsburgh. We have Norm Nardini i playing for us. We have the Christian Beck Band. They are the #1 country band in Pittsburgh. We have Billy the Kid and the Regulators. They are the #1 blues band in Pittsburgh. We have been very fortunate. We have our shirts in. Troy Polamalu autographed a Steeler jersey for us. Andrew McCutcheon signed a Pirate jersey for us. The Steelers sent an autographed football. There are going to be a lot of reasons to be there, but the biggest reason to be there is to help three little girls that are in need. They lost both of their parents last year as most of us know. It is an ongoing situation. Their needs are immediate and constant. Their 78 years old grandfather is taking care

of them and that is the situation we are in. We are here to help them. It was great last year and the Township was unbelievably beneficial last year and all the other people who helped out and volunteered. I just want to say thanks again and please keep the date of June 27th open. I will email the flyer to the Township Manager so that it can go on the website as it did last year.

Presentation by Marissa Boff Haney (South Hills Pet Rescue), I am here on behalf of South Hills Pet Rescue to say that we are extremely thankful to Robinson Township and Settlers Ridge for hosting the first annual Pets on Parade on Saturday, June 13th. Proceeds benefit our mission to save dogs from unwarranted euthanasia. Nick Ferraro and I are both Robinson natives and Montour alum. Although I did not know Nick in high school, our paths crossed two years ago when I realized that healthy, well-behaved pets are put to sleep every day. We pull dogs from high kill shelters, saving all breeds with all needs. Nick Ferraro is who I believe, the dog whisperer of Pittsburgh. His training abilities are recognized in the community and he has been granted court ordered dogs based on his efforts. I would like to share two stories with you quickly about the Robinson Autumn Festival that really shows the generosity and love for animals of the Robinson residents. Last year we had a young boy come up to us and say "I want to donate my last \$2.00 to your rescue because dogs are my life." That just moved me. The year before, a young boy in front of me asked to tell his friends to donate instead of receiving birthday presents that year. These are young children in the Robinson community. With that being said, Pets on Parade is a perfect way to show off your best friend. The first 100 registered attendees will receive an "I love my Pet" t-shirt sponsored by The Ridge at Robinson and a goody bag with treats, toys and accessories all made possible by Giant Eagle, Red Robin, All State, Pet Supplies Plus and other local sponsors. We have several contests ready to strut your mutt, such as best costume, best parade float, owner look-alike contest and creative grooming. Robinson Recreation is going to be there with some fun kid activities such as face painting. There will be music and other pet related vendors. Again, on behalf of South Hills Pet Rescue, we are sincerely grateful for this opportunity and would like to thank Robinson Township for selecting us as the beneficiary for this event. Since January, we were able to save 189 dogs and we are proud to say that we have re-homed 100 of those dogs, if not more by now. With your support, we are confident we can increase those numbers. Thank you very much.

ENGINEER'S REPORT

The Engineers Report dated June 1, 2015 is attached.

Engineer Meyer, bids have been received for the 2015 Road Program. We are recommending the award of the bid in the amount of \$512,508.60 to Russell Standard of Mars, PA. They were about \$9,000 less than the second low bidder, which was El Grande. It was a very close bid. We have talked with some of the people who have worked with Russell Standard before and they have been pleased with their work.

CAPITAL PROJECTS

Fawnvue Dr. Storm Sewer – Construction has been completed by public works. Drains have been working well.

Fawnvue Dr. Landslide – The geotechnical company has conducted the drilling and sample collection exercise. We are awaiting their report.

Park Manor Blvd. Draining – we have secured a cost estimate and are having a televising crew go down and look at some of the culverts downstream of the broken pipe to determine what areas need fixed and where some of the flow is coming in from the system.

August Dr. Inlet Replacement – typically this would be something that Public Works would do if it was just an inlet, but this is 18 ft. deep and there are a lot of cross pipes. We had a contractor go out and take a look at it and they were quoting an estimate of about \$40,000 to do this work. It is probably something we will have to put out to bid to come up with another way of looking at it as opposed to having Public Works.

Projects are under review: ISC, Montour Elementary School, Pleasant View Condominiums, Providence Presbyterian Church, Two Marquis Plaza, Brandy Mill Woods Site Plan, The Ridge at Robinson Site Plan, Arbor Trail Subdivision, Hampton Inn, Hilton Garden Inn, Penn Center West Building #1 Parking Lot and Grace Manor Phase II.

DEVELOPMENTAL INSPECTIONS

ISC – the developer is continuing work on the site.

Montour Elementary School – Contractor is continuing to work on site. Site work is approximately 80% complete.

Providence Presbyterian Church – the contractor is continuing to work at the site. The site work is approximately 95% complete.

Pleasant View Condominiums – awaiting submittal of information from the developer.

Two Marquis Plaza – contractor is continuing work on the extension of stormwater conveyance system to include replacement of old storm sewer pipes along with the new construction. Storm sewer work is 95% complete.

Brandy Mill Wood Site Plan – contractor is working on site grading and storm sewer work.

The Ridge at Robinson Site Plan – clearing and grubbing work complete.

Arbor Trail Subdivision – contractor is continuing earthwork and storm sewer work at the site.

Hampton Inn – contractor is continuing work at the site.

Hilton Garden Inn – contractor is continuing work at the site.

Penn Center West Building #1 Parking Lot – we have provided a punch list prior to the recommendation for the release. The developer has not completed the items on the punch list.

Grace Manor Phase II – met with developer and conducted inspection of the site before the wearing course application. Recommendations to the developer have been made.

DEVELOPMENTAL REVIEWS

The following developments are under review: Campbells Run Business Center Building 2 Site Plan, Moon Run Residential Development Plan have been approved and we are awaiting Development Agreements and performance bonds. Bayer Heritage Drive Subdivision is on hold. The Lang Conditional Use hearing was held prior to this meeting. The last one that is ongoing is Parkside Land Development Plan and that is under review. They will be appearing before the Planning Commission on June 17th.

Chairman Abatta, as far as the road program is concerned, we have a start date?

Engineer Meyer, I believe that we are looking at August 15th. That is one of the things that we had put into the specs this year is the Notice to Proceed. Tomorrow we will begin preparing the submission for the contractor. We will also schedule the pre-construction meeting for the week prior to August 15th. I have talked to the contractor as well and told him those dates and they are getting setup for it and putting it in their schedule. Everything should be going along that date.

Chairman Abatta, hopefully that will all be on the website so the residents know when we are working and what specific roads we are working on correct?

Mgr. Silka, that is correct.

Chairman Abatta, we have a lot of development going on in Robinson Twp., both residential and commercial, and sometimes there is a little bit of a traffic jam or you are held up so just be patient as a resident and realize that we are doing everything that we can to better our Township.

POLICE REPORT

Lt. Krall submitted a copy of the May Report, which is attached to the minutes.

ADMINISTRATION UPDATE

Mgr. Silka, in regards to the comprehensive plan update, our consultant is doing a lot of the background work. Our steering committee will be meeting every month on the 3rd Friday of the month at 9:00 a.m. The grant is fine and everything is working on there. Hopefully we can start setting up some of the public input meetings within the next month.

On the recycling program update, we are about two month into the automated recycling totes and overwhelmingly the feedback has been positive. We have a few negatives, but most of the comments that we are getting in the office are positive. I do want to state that there are some people having problems that they actually recycle too much for one bin and every two weeks, so I was able to work with Waste Management and we are able to offer a second toter for them at a cost of \$1.25 extra per month or \$3.75 per quarter if anyone is having that positive problem of having too many recyclables. If anybody would like to take advantage of that, they can call the office and we will set them up for an additional toter.

CDBG Year 40 Funding Increase, last year we re-did the handicap restrooms on the second floor and it was a \$28,000 project and we received \$14,025 in CDBG funds. We had committed to Township funds at \$14,000 to complete this project. Another municipality has withdrew its funding request for CDBG 40 so we were able to get the additional \$14,025 to cover the cost 100% out of CDBG funding from the COG. That was a positive that we had that we could save ourselves \$14,000.

Lastly, I had updated the Board that we were looking at possibly going to a smaller group salt bid in the next year. SHACOG decided to move their time frame up a little bit so we were not able to get our independent bid out, so we will be bidding again with SHACOG for salt. Looking forward, we are thinking of forming a smaller purchasing cooperative with a couple of the larger municipalities within our region where we can do some cooperative purchasing outside the purchasing alliance that will benefit the very close municipalities around us. That is my report.

TOWNSHIP SOLICITOR'S REPORT

Solicitor Cambest had no report.

FINANCE REPORT

Vice-Chairman Shiwarski, last week at the Township building there was a meeting that gave an overview of the police pension fund. I would like to share that with the Board and the community. The starting value of the police pension fund on January 1st of 2014 was \$12,963,373. The investments for that year earned the Township and the fund, \$250,120.42. The contributions combined from the employees (police officers) and the Township was \$785,849.00. The withdrawals from the pensioners came to \$485,278.00. The value at the end of the year was \$14,168,567. That means that the total return on our investment in the police pension fund was at 6.91% for the year. In 2015 for the time frame of January 1 thru April 30th, the starting value was \$14,168,567. Our investments so far this year have earned us \$67,890.64. The contributions from the Township and the employees has been \$49,915.00 so far and the withdrawals have equaled \$172,981.00. The value as of this point of the police pension fund is \$14,413,630.00. That is for the year 2015, a return on invest of 2.6%. The total change in value for the police pension fund from January 1, 2014 thru April 30, 2015 was an increase even after all of the withdrawals of \$1,450,257.18. PNC has administered the fund for us over the last 5 years. In 2010 we had a 10.74% increase on investments. In 2011 it was 1.98%, in 2012 it was 11.61% and in 2013 it was 15.23%. As I said, in 2014 it was 6.91%. We need a 2.27% return to keep pace with the withdrawals. As you see, we are substantially ahead of that. The police pension fund is currently funded at 85%, which is above standard for a municipal pension fund. The definition of funded is, the percentage of the amount needed if the entire group took the pension all at the same time, (current 11 retirees and 29 active contributors) would take their pension all at one time, plus any fees or costs involved with that. On the whole, over the last five years we have made substantial progress, not only internally within the Township, but as compared to other municipalities.

Chairman Abatta, it is a very stable account.

Vice-Chairman Shiwarski, just to recap the regular finance report, our checking on hand as of May 31st was \$3,319,249 plus \$85,038 in the pool account. As of 5/31 we have \$3,489,449.20 fund balance after reconciling our assets and liabilities. Our EIT for 2015, we have collected \$1,460,829 versus last year when at the same point we were \$1,333,000, so we are ahead of pace in collecting EIT tax. That is approximately 58% of what we had budgeted so far. The LST tax, we have collected \$101,576 versus last year of \$277,000. We are behind last year's collection on LST and we budgeted \$950,000 this year. So far this year through the end of May, we have collected \$40,672 in delinquent taxes. Our real estate tax, we have collected \$2,333,582. As a comparison last year at this time we had collected \$2,081,000. In 2013 we collected \$1,610,000. We are ahead of pace on real estate taxes over the last two years.

So far this year for our budget we have collected in revenues, \$5,743,000. We have budgeted for the year \$13,624,000. In revenue which means that 41% of our revenues have been collected so far this year. We have paid out \$4,452,202 in expenses, we have budgeted \$13,536,000 in 2015. That means that we have paid out approximately 33% of our budgeted expenses. Just some real quick drill down on a couple of accounts that

of our budgeted expenses. Just some real quick drill down on a couple of accounts that we said we would watch and have been doing a good job on this: Engineering – we have budgeted \$140,000 for the year and we have spent \$52,910 which is 37% of our budget. Our total legal we budgeted \$135,000, which is \$100,000 for the solicitor and we have spent \$25,574, which is 21% of the total budget. In other legal we have spent \$7,975, which is 22% of the budget. Our forecast on the financial health, I think that everything seems to be on pace. I would just have one question for our finance officer, should we have any concern about the LST that we are behind on?

Mr. Kezmarsky, it is pretty much normal and nothing to be concerned about at this point in the year.

Chairman Abatta, that is great that you and Jerry are keeping an eye on the finances. The reports should very positive and I am sure that a lot of the residents are happy to hear those positive numbers. Thank you for the hard work. It is appreciated.

Vice-Chairman Shiwarski, the Board and administrative staff have put together a realistic budget and they are adhering to the budget all throughout the year, so everybody is doing their share.

All of those things are taken into consideration for the criteria. We also try to use more than one method in order to touch more roads and stay ahead of the curve.

Chairman Abatta, I think what Mr. Meyer has always said, "if you don't spend a dollar today, it is going to cost you \$5.00 down the road."

Engineer Meyer, that is correct. I not only say that, but the Federal Highway Administration says that. I do want to commend the Board on doing this. We all understand the need for money and you drive through so many towns and you are wishing they would fix the roads. You have taken that step and made this one of the many priorities and you should be commended for it. To try to come up with that money every year and to try and keep this going to make sure you roads are passable, you should be commended.

COMMISSIONER COMMENTS

Commissioner Mapel, I just have one thought to share with the Board this evening. I try not to take people's time needlessly to talk about internal things that don't matter, but as time goes on and we see this Township grow over the past years that I have been here, I have seen many things develop that I did not think would happen as quickly as they are. Our financial situation was not that great when I first came on this Board, but that has turned around to our benefit and I commend everyone who has worked diligently toward that effort. However, I have had more than just a handful of people in the past six months approach me and ask me why this Township does not have sidewalks for people to safely walk on. We can walk within our own plan and various different neighborhoods which are older and established, but we cannot walk on sidewalks that are safe to go any place. The person that I succeeded on this Board, Mr. Tallon, that was one of his passions as I recall. One of the things that I listened very

intently to him talk about while he was still actively involved, was how we could initiate this. Obviously if you throw enough money at something it will go away and we were not in any position to do that. As we see hotels developing and multi-family dwellings springing up here with a different mindset as to what we are going to see as development and revenue that is available, I would certainly encourage this Board to consider brainstorming on how we can make that happen in memory of Mr. Tallon, if nothing else. It was a wonderful concept. As you know, safety has always been my number one priority. I see people walking to work or they may even be staying in a hotel that they don't belong here and it is very unsafe. I have talked to Mr. Urbano about this when I previously chaired Building and Zoning. We had several discussions about this. It would be a considerable financial undertaking to make this happen, but if we truly are a First Class Township more than just on paper then I think this is probably something that we should consider making happen at some point. With that, I will just wish you all a happy and safe summer. Be careful on the roads, particularly if you are walking on one that does not have a sidewalk.

Commissioner Barefoot, just one question for Lt. Krall. Did we hear from the baseball team?
